DJ Williams was named the 2010 Disney Spirit Award recipient, which is given to the most inspirational figure in college football, on Nov. 15. On Dec. 9, he was named the first Mackey Award winner in Arkansas history as the nation's top tight end. He finished his UA career with 152 receptions, the second-highest total in school history and the most by a non-wide receiver, and 1,855 receiving yards, which ranks eighth on UA's all-time list. In his career, Williams started 32 games while appearing in 51, the most by any player on the 2010 Arkansas roster.

In 2010, he started all 13 games and led the team with 54 receptions, the fourth-highest single-season total in UA history. Williams accounted for 627 receiving yards and a singleseason career-high four touchdowns. He was named first-team All- SEC by the Associated Press and the conference's coaches and also named to the SEC Community Service Team. His 4.2 receptions-per-game average ranked seventh in the SEC. In the Sugar Bowl vs. No. 6 Ohio State, he caught five passes for 38 yards and added a two-point conversion reception in Arkansas' first BCS bowl appearance. He caught three passes for 28 yards in Arkansas' 31-23 victory vs. No. 6 LSU. At No. 22 Mississippi State the week before, Williams tied for the team lead with four receptions totaling a season-high 70 yards and one touchdown in a 38-31 double-overtime victory. He tied a single-game career high with two receiving touchdowns on five receptions for 58 yards vs. UTEP. He piled up a then season-high 67 yards on five catches at No. 18 South Carolina. He caught a season-high six balls, including two on the Razorbacks' three-play, gamewinning drive that started with 47 seconds left in a 31-24 victory at Georgia. He caught three passes for 32 yards and one touchdown against Vanderbilt and grabbed two passes for a teamleading 55 yards against Ole Miss. He had five receptions each against No. 1 Alabama and Tennessee Tech, accounting for 63 yards vs. the Crimson Tide and 44 vs. the Golden Eagles. He had four catches for 20 yards at Auburn. Against ULM and Texas A&M, he hauled in three passes for 44 and 23 yards, respectively.

During the busy season of football, DJ Williams found time to season to choreograph and play with the marching band during our band Spectacular.
